

WHAT MAKES CLIVEDEN HOUSE SPECIAL

The 376 acres of National Trust formal gardens and woodlands feature the celebrated Parterre, season-long floral displays, distinctive topiary, and a collection of exceptional sculptures. Works of art on the grounds also include the Fountain of Love, Roman Sarcophagi, and an Amphitheatre where the first recital of "Rule Britannia" was played. The Pavilion was built to commemorate the Battle of Blenheim.

Cliveden has a listed outdoor swimming pool. The 'Profumo Pool' (as it is sometimes known) is located within the walled garden of the Cliveden Spa and was the setting for a scandal which shook parliament in 1961. Conservative MP John Profumo, who was a dinner guest that evening of Lord Astor Cliveden's then owner, came across Osteopath Stephen Ward who was staying in Spring Cottage with friends, including the nineteen-year-old Christine Keeler (mistress of a suspected Russian spy) as they were larking around in the pool – the rest is history!

The award-winning Cliveden Spa has its own Cliveden Body Collection of at-home vegan spa products, inspired by two of the powerful ladies of the house Anna Maria; the first 'Mistress of Cliveden' and Nancy Astor; its most famous chatelaine. This bespoke body collection is designed by luxury British skincare brand Oskia.

Cliveden has strong links to British royalty and has hosted every monarch since George I. Cliveden welcomed Meghan Markle in May 2018, who spent the night before her royal wedding to Prince Harry at Cliveden. Queen Victoria often travelled to Cliveden by boat from Windsor Castle to take tea with her great friend the Duchess of Sutherland, arriving at Cliveden secluded Spring Cottage on the banks of the Thames.

Cliveden House hosts an annual Literary Festival each autumn, where writers, politicians and public figures gather to continue the 350-year-old tradition of power, politicians and lively discussion that have reverberated in the literary salons of Cliveden throughout the ages. Most recent speakers have included Sebastian Faulks, Chibundu Onuzo, Kate Moss, Simon Sebag Montefiore, David Baddiel, Tina Brown, Leila Slimani, Michael Gove MP, and Natalie Livingstone.



Every Room and Suite at Cliveden is named after a past guest. From George Bernard Shaw and the Duchess of Sutherland to Prince Albert and Lord Astor, each room is unique. The Stanford Suite is named after Stanford University of California, who took a lease of Cliveden for use as one of its overseas campuses in 1969 until 1983.

Lady Astor was the first women to take her seat in Parliament. Female Suffrage (for women over 30) had become law in February 1918 and for the first time a women could stand for parliament. Nancy Astor was elected by a majority of 5,203 votes on the 28^{th of} November 1919. In 1928 Nancy Astor remembered her early days in the House – "I had the privilege of being the first woman in the House of Commons, and sometimes I used to doubt whether it was a privilege. When I stood up and asked questions affecting women and children, social and moral questions, I used to be shouted at for 5 or 10 minutes at a time. That was when they thought that I was rather a freak, a voice crying in the wilderness". Many MPs refused to speak to her, Churchill later told her "We hoped to freeze you out".

Cliveden has appeared on the silver screen. The Beatles filmed part of their 'Help!' film at Cliveden in 1965. The estate's iconic Fountain of Love and Golden Clock Tower were recreated for the 2014 remake of Cinderella starring Lily James and Cliveden was mentioned in Downton Abbey by Lady Mary as the location of a house party she attended. Many of the screen from the Hollywood movie 'A Little Chaos' starring Kate Winslet and the now late Alan Rickman were also film at Cliveden.

Cliveden House is built on top of a 'sounding room' which was built in 1666 and is the oldest example of such a structure in Britain. The vast domed shaped space below the house would regularly house musicians, whose music would be amplified both up into the Great Hall, and out onto the Parterre.
